

“You’re Just Like Your Father But Is That A Good Thing?”

Exodus 34:7; Deuteronomy 6:4-6

A negative reaction to life in general is a sign of failure because it’s how to be weak without even trying by pretending that your problems are not really there in hopes that they’ll somehow disappear on their own.

The easiest thing to do in life is to choose to become a weak non-participating loser; that requires practically no effort at all.

Removal of our self-disciplined restraint by reacting instead of responding to being hurt causes us to become instantly self-centered and therefore involved in self-justification where we are always right and this soon removes our overall restraint on our volition.

So, due to our self-perceived irreconcilable differences, we divorce ourselves from reality because we fail to take responsibility for our own decisions since our self-restraint has been willingly removed.

We are not justified in doing wrong because we’ve been wronged; in that case, we’ve reacted with bitterness instead of responding with unconditional love and our reaction immediately removes all of our self-restraint.

The principle is that repetition is our friend in Bible study for our indoctrination so that our rate of learning will exceed our rate of forgetting because the truth is: We don’t really know something until we CANNOT forget it.

And these flaws are never understood or addressed because the people involved are willfully reacting to the abuse and failure of their parents, in other words, blaming them for their own negative decisions.

When people are first set free from slavery, they’re inclined to think that freedom means having a license to do anything they want; even to break the laws of the land and hate anyone who stands in their way in doing so.

The key to the stability of any nation is found in the homes of every family in that nation.

We’re now in the fourth generation especially among our young people and this is a very serious problem since the fourth generation of the curse can easily be the cause of the destruction of an entire partner nation to God under His discipline.

Apart from someone’s own culpability, no one is under the four-generation curse because the sins of the parents have to be repeated in the children of the next generation for culpability and punitive action to be administered.

A partner nation to God must have a people who have humility and after being evangelized and responding positively, are willing to learn biblical truth and this teachability overflows to every area in the daily lives of the citizens.

The four-generation curse is broken by salvation through faith in Jesus Christ plus the learning, believing and applying of His mindset by parents who are teaching their children about God’s supernatural spiritual life.

The key to the continuation of a partner nation to God is always related to the next generation of young people—whether or not they receive proper training in authority orientation, are evangelized, grow in grace and hopefully form a Jeshurun contingent.

World-system oriented believers tend to gaze at the problem instead of at a viable, biblical solution, so they were frightened by these giants which caused them to enter into a miserable state of emotional revolt of the soul.

Despising the Lord means failure to fulfill the spiritual life provided by Him and the pardon of the Exodus generation had no positive impact on their rebellious souls.

Only maximum knowledge of biblical truth in the Millennium will break the four-generation curse through the functions of God's New Covenant to Israel.
